From the Chair

Dear Friends:

I hope you are all weathering winter well. Just hold on, it's almost over! Before you know it, the days will be getting longer; the sun will be shining brighter; and you might even get the urge to get involved in service (if you're not already).

Last month I had the privilege to attend the Northeast Regional Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly (NERASSA), which was held February 22-24, in West Atlantic City, NJ. The purpose of NERASSA is for GSRs, DCMs, Area Committee Members and Intergroup Representatives of the Northeast Region to discuss General Service Conference-related issues and concerns affecting AA as a whole, as well as pertinent aspects of recovery, unity, and service common to the areas of the Region. There were a total of 906 registered members who came together to listen to various presentations, hear views from other members while having the opportunity to express their own opinions and/or concerns.

There panel discussions were about Communication & Participation, Our 7th Tradition, Love and Tolerance, Anonymity, Newcomers, 12 Step Calls, AA Today and Tomorrow and Being a Trusted Servant. Some of the points I took away from the conference were (1) to revive the Birthday plan to help support GSO (send \$1 for every year of sobriety); (2) service helps keep the fellowship united; (3) educate your group about service and where donations go; (4) what is our primary purpose and how we can keep it from being diluted; (5) practicing love & tolerance; (6) gratitude for the diversity in AA; (7) how new technology has been incorporated in sharing the message of AA and how we can't forget about those who do not have access to it and so much more. There was a business meeting with over 250 people in attendance. Very interesting! In the evening's there were roundtable meetings on various topics (and of course I attended the ones about Intergroup).

The reality is that we all struggle with many of the same issues in AA and if we all focus on what the primary purpose of Alcoholic Anonymous is, AA should live forever!

From the Treasurer:

Treasurer Reports & Records 2

A few months back we started to talk about treasurer reports and records, largely from the point of view of the treasurer. This month we'll return to that topic, but from the point of view of the group member looking at the reports.

What to look for? To start, does the opening balance this month match the closing balance from last month? If not, ask why? Usually such a shift reflects a corrected balance for the last month.

Any unusual income or expense items? In most groups things are pretty routine. There may be a jump in expenses however in a month in which new literature is bought or in which contributions are made to the service structure (usually Intergroup and General Service).

Anything else unusual may be questioned, not because we mistrust our treasurer, but because we are involved with our group and want to understand so as to better participate in helping reach the informed group conscience on money matters. Usually the treasurer can quickly and easily detail any line clearing up any questions. Sometimes too you may have fairly caught an error. (Yes, we treasurers sometimes do make mistakes!)

If there is a bank account, the entire group does not need to review the statements, but at least one trusted servant other than the treasurer should. You should be able to reconcile the treasurer's report to any bank statement. (For the period being considered, add to the bank's closing balance any deposits made but not reflected and subtract any expenses not listed. The resulting figure should match the treasurer's closing balance for the same period.) Again, this does not reflect any fundamental mistrust, but is in support and appreciation for the work of the treasurer.

The business meeting should be willing to take the time to allow careful consideration of the treasurer's report. This process need not take too much time once the group gets to understand the style of the treasurer's report.

The program offers a lot such as panel presentations on Conference workshop topics, late night service committee roundtables, banquet speaker meeting, fellowshipping, and so on. My detailed report on NERAASA will be given at our April 21st NGSG meeting.
