## From the Chair -

## <u>Safe Haven</u>

One important thing AA offers newcomers is a sense of safety, safety not only in the cover anonymity offers as we begin to come to terms with the damage our drinking has done, begin to clean house and begin to seek emotional and spiritual growth, but also in the feeling of community and shelter our home groups can offer.

The newly sober are vulnerable in many ways. We are just beginning to learn to trust, to be more open and honest. We are unsure and unpracticed having stunted our emotional growth through our drinking years. In many ways, we are adults with all that means but facing the challenges of adolescence for the first time. We have some growing to do, and there will be some trial and error.

Recognizing the vulnerability of our newer members, more grounded and secure members may accept an obligation to assure AA is a safe haven for the newcomer. This seems as much in the spirit of "pass it on" as is sharing our experience, strength and hope on Step work. How then can I help assure that safe haven for the AA novice? Several things come to mind.

As individuals and as a group, we set a tone. (This is the "power of example.") To start, we respect the principle of anonymity. Confidences need to be kept, gossip avoided. We can talk collectively about what respecting anonymity means, perhaps through Tradition 11 and 12 meetings and discussions.

We can encourage the use of sponsorship that tested program of encouragement, support and guidance so beneficial to all of us. We can also support group membership by making our groups inviting, and by encouraging newcomers to join. For new group members, a job may be a helpful tether, coffee maker, greeter or some other small responsibility perhaps.

We don't talk about it much, but there are also among us those who will prey on beginners or other vulnerable members in one way or another. We should be willing to buffer their involvement with the vulnerable, or even to intervene more assertively as individual members and as a group should we note something untoward happening. A senior group member may need to prompt the group to acknowledge a problem and to take action. Where something extreme may be occurring, groups especially need to come together to resolve an approach. (We can use our business meetings to this end.) In some instances, we may need to be willing to bar predators from our groups, or even, in rare cases, to engage the police. In a very real way, lives are at stake along with the integrity of AA.

Am I helping to watch out for the welfare of newer and other vulnerable members, to assure my home group is a safe haven?

In other matters, our annual picnic will be held at Eisenhower Park on 15 July. Check this issue of the newsletter or our website for details.

## From the DCMC -

<u>Changes in A.A. -</u> Was Your Voice in A.A. Heard?

AA's General Service Conference met recently to review suggestions for changes in AA's operations, products, services, and even one of our Twelve Traditions. Did you get to express your opinion on those "matters of importance?" Were you consulted, as a member of AA?

Your voice, and your group's conscience, is expressed by your group's General Service Representative (GSR). AA as a whole communicates through your GSR. If you participated through your GSR to AA's ability to make good choices, thank you!

Want to know what decisions were made? On June 9, GSRs from through Area 49 (the 12 counties of South Eastern NY) gathered to learn about those changes from our Delegate to the General Service Conference. Your group's GSR can report at a group business meeting about those changes, the reasons behind them, and the discussions about them, if they attended the Assembly.

If your group doesn't have a GSR, your voice was not heard, and you may not receive information about current and future matters of importance to AA. By electing a GSR, your group will become connected to AA's General Service structure, and through it, add your voice to decision-making in AA. GSRs in Nassau County meet the 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday of every other month (August 20<sup>th</sup> is our next Nassau Genera Service meeting; new GSR registration & orientation is 7 pm) at the Nassau Intergroup Office.

If your group has a GSR who didn't attend the Assembly, you'll still be able to learn about the changes (or decisions to not change things) in AA. Every registered GSR receives, on behalf of the group they represent, a copy of AA's Annual Report. It's a very extensive description of A.A.'s operations, finances, issues, activities, statistics, and all things AA: think of it as a report from 'management' (that is, our trusted servants) to the 'owners' of AA (our members, as represented by their informed group conscience through their GSR).
