

From the Chair— After the Storm

Many AAs were adversely affected by the recent hurricane and snow storm presenting profound challenges to their lives. In some cases, homes, businesses and cars were swept away along with a lifetime's collection of mementos. Some lost more. AA meetings too were shuttered by the storms. It has truly been a time of crisis.

In the midst of such destruction and disruption, the spirit of the AA fellowship shone brightly with special efforts on the part of many to reach out to and support their suffering fellows. In the same generous spirit shown in the old time stories from the "Big Book," members had members sleeping in spare rooms and on couches. Some members shuttled supplies including food, clothing and difficult in some places to find gasoline to fellow members in more damaged communities. The home group in some places returned to its roots with meetings being moved to members' homes. Nassau Intergroup too rallied resources to assure we could still find meetings by hosting an open house and offering to work with local emergency services to establish temporary meetings in shelters or crisis centers. For some, helping others served to reduce a feeling of helplessness in the face of catastrophe.

I was touched to find in meetings held shortly after the main storm members reaching out to struggling newcomers as usual (AA's response to crisis is always the same, the 12 Steps and fellowship), in one case to a man finding his way on day one out of rehab, in another to a member coming up on several months recovery displaced from home by the storm and clearly feeling discouraged and isolated. They were in the right place, and got the attention, encouragement and support they needed in that moment.

The recent Thanksgiving Alkathon at the Intergroup office too showed the Fellowship of the Spirit at its best. I noted at one meeting a man who shared that in a prior year the Alkathon at Intergroup had been the only place for him to go on the holiday as he had not been welcomed by his family, a situation happily no longer the case for him thanks to AA. The holiday Alkathons have always offered a special experience with a rich mix of members at very different points in recovery, each there for the same reason.

Thank you all for showing that "together we can." I'm reminded too that, while the gas lines are gone and most lives have returned to routine, many struggle still, and especially need the loving hand of AA. In other matters, this will be my final article as an officer with Nassau Intergroup, the last over a period of the six years as I moved from treasurer, to first vice chair, to chair, a total of 72 writings.

Well into my 32nd year in recovery now, since I was doing my 90 in 90 I've always had an AA job, a service role, from coffee maker on. I can't help but think my relative success in recovery has been linked to those jobs, to the challenges presented by unfamiliar experiences, to the people I've met, and to the opportunities to grow in recovery I've enjoyed as a result. My experiences with Intergroup in particular have been rich with challenge and opportunity.

My thanks to the AA members who have participated in the life of AA. Were it not for the spirit you have shown in support of our Fifth Tradition, many of us, myself included, would not have had even a shot at recovery. I'm reminded that we serve as links in the chain of recovery and fellowship that reaches back to the kitchen table in Brooklyn where Ebby reached out to Bill, and on to the gate house in Akron where Bill reached out to Bob. The rest is history, our history.

I've always felt sorry for the "hit and run" members, those who come for the meeting, share or don't share and leave before the cleanup without becoming a part of the group. Where's the fellowship in that? Where's the one drunk helping another? Such was the formula Bill confirmed for himself standing in the lobby of the Mayflower Hotel in 1935, and which seems to have worked well for many since, the links in the chain. The "Big Book" (p. 89) reminds us, that "practical experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics."

Special thanks now to the members of Nassau Intergroup who are rotating out of their service jobs at this time. This rotation's Steering Committee has in particular been stellar as have the group Reps. Thanks to Brenda O., who coordinated our Thanksgiving Alkathon. Thanks too to Ken W., and committee for the Big Meeting, one of the best open meetings I have attended.

From the DCMC Nassau

Service comes in many forms, and our members have shown recently how the spirit of service shows itself in Nassau County.

Most directly, many of us invented instant meetings by phone or in person when Hurricane Sandy made it impossible to meet in our usual rooms. Some of us reached out through prayer & meditation, and through our literature, amidst lighting candles or huddling with our families. Some prayed for strength and helped – or were helped by – their neighbors in bailing out basements, removing debris, etc. Some groups found temporary space, and some have lost theirs indefinitely.

We've all found ways to make whatever progress we can. For some, it will take a long time to recover from the physical, emotional, and financial damage the storms may have caused. For others, life has largely returned to whatever we can call "normal." Nassau General Service & Intergroup postponed a Group Officer workshop, which we'll reschedule in 2013. Nassau's Big Meeting happened as scheduled on November 17, with about 75 people attending.

Nassau Intergroup arranged temporary meetings and performed other services the way alcoholics in recovery do best in and through our fellowship: one day at a time, doing the best we can with what we have, and helping each other in every way we can. Nassau General Service will continue to do what we can to support Intergroup in its "front line" role locally.

But what we've learned in our program and fellowship can't be damaged by natural events. Perhaps some turned to drink in response to the storms, but they know that the hand of A.A. will continue to reach out to them. All of us know that no matter what happens, our fellowship will do what we can to make ourselves available if we only try to find it.

I'd also like to acknowledge our outgoing officers and committee chairs whose terms end this month: 2nd Alternate DCMC Bill E., Alt. Treasurer John Z., Alt. Secretary John R., Big Meeting Chair Ken W., and Budget/Financial Review Chair Carlos M. Thanks for your service!

Be host to A.A. friends, especially newcomers. If you don't have a place where you can throw a formal party, take one person to a diner and spring for the coffee.



Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations

given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.



If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.



Don't think you have to stay late. Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



Worship in your own way.



Don't sit around brooding. Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations. Remember— "one day at a time."



Enjoy the true beauty of holiday love and joy. Maybe you cannot give material gifts—but this year, you can give love.
