A Veteran's Story

My name is Jim G., and I'm a Vietnam Veteran. My sober date is 12/02/2003. Shortly after getting sober, I started to develop a series of anger-related problems. I was also being treated for depression when the doctor who was seeing me suggested that I should see a professional for my anger issues. After a couple of visits, the therapist suggested that I contact the VA, because he thought I might be suffering from a Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

Sometime later I was diagnosed with PTSD. I went into therapy for this problem, and it seemed the longer I was sober the worse the side effects got. (I was told this is normal.)

When I was finishing up the therapy, I asked the therapist if there was an alcoholic in therapy that I could speak to. I was told there was, but the person wanted to remain anonymous. So that was that!

Sometime later I was asked to attend a luncheon for veterans at a counseling center. The speaker was saying something about possibly starting an AA group for veterans. After the meeting, I went up to the person and offered my services in starting such an AA meeting. So Rich H., Phil J., and I got it up and running.

Being an intergroup rep (and having a sponsor who did it before me) I had a pretty good idea of how it's done. The following Sunday, we had our first meeting (April 2012). The Veterans in Recovery Group was born. We meet on Sundays at 7:30. The meeting is open to alcoholics with the emphasis on veterans. At first, some people would get upset because it was a veterans meeting. (What? This is discrimination!) When a returning veteran walks in the room and says, "Thank you for being here," it makes it all worthwhile. I was told in AA that only an alcoholic can help another alcoholic. Well, I believe only an alcoholic veteran can help another alcoholic veteran.

I'm a firm believer in how this program works. Stay away from a drink one day at a time. Do the Steps, work them in your life, and do service. The group brings AA meetings into the Northport VA hospital twice a week on Monday evenings and Friday mornings.

Nassau County's Seniors in Sobriety

The Nassau County Intergroup Steering Committee members bring a lot of energy and enthusiasm. Liz P.'s efforts to update the 12 Step List was going full force until she fell down the stairs. The resultant broken ankle threatened to thwart Liz's efforts to intercept as many groups as possible at the Share A Day. (Hope you are feeling better and healing quickly Liz!) I offered to take the list of groups that we were hoping to connect with and try to find them at Share-a-Day.

As I was sitting at the front desk watching people sign in there were two lovely ladies who listed their home group as Seniors In Sobriety. I followed them into the cafeteria, and set about asking them to take the form and get the 12 Step List updated. Helen looked me in the eye and told me, "No, we don't do that." I asked why, and Helen proceeded to tell me about Seniors In Sobriety. I put on my original hat as the Chairperson of the Special Needs Committee for Intergroup as Helen educated me.

Here is some of what Helen told me about seniors that are in recovery:

- Some seniors may have issues sleeping, and cannot be woken up during the night for 12 Step calls, so no Night Book commitments.
- Some seniors can have challenges with moving around, and accessibility to the space can be an issue.
- A senior alcoholic can get lost in a meeting. Younger people and seniors may not connect. The younger ones have jobs, families, and houses. The seniors need other seniors to identify with.
- It can be hard to get seniors to take commitments when the newcomers may be 75 years old, and may have issues getting to meetings. Plus, can they lift the large coffee pots?
- Seniors may tend to go to day time meetings as it is easier to drive in the day light. So, the senior groups are not going to the Exchange Meeting as it is too limiting.
- The stories of the seniors that are sober are often not drug driven. Drugs may be mentioned in passing, but not the larger topic that is with younger people.

I really enjoyed speaking with Helen, and knew that we would enjoy each other's company. We made plans for me to meet her at Seniors In Sobriety on Friday at 11 AM at 385 Oak Street in Garden City. In true AA style everyone said hi to me and introduced themselves. I knew a few when I walked in, but many when I left. It was an anniversary meeting, upbeat and fun. But, while my home group members may share about children and jobs, here there was a lot of sharing and laughing about misplacing their walking canes. The group reaches out to seniors, but all are welcome. Older people may not identify with the younger people who are talking about drugs and relationships. Seniors identify with different things. The younger people can enjoy listening to the older folks, and can get strength from doing so.

Old fashioned 12 step work abounds here. Although some seniors can no longer drive, others step in and provide rides to meetings. There are foot problems, eye sight issues, diabetes and other physical limitations that affect seniors' ability to get to meetings. Helen makes it a point to call people from the Seniors In Sobriety Group if someone misses a meeting whether it is a man or a woman. Seniors are more concerned than younger AAs that there may be a serious health issue going on.

The issues of 12 stepping a senior who is not currently sober into AA are varied and many. Helen says that no one is too old to get sober, and that they have people coming into AA at 73, 82 etc. People think that when they walk into a meeting filled with people with grey hair that they all have long term sobriety. That may not be so. The person may be drinking for many years and be even more resistant to suggestions regarding AA. In cooperation with the professional community, some outside groups do refer seniors to Senior meetings.

Helen says that Seniors In Sobriety tend to stick to "old AA": Steps, Big Book, following suggestions, sharing and commitments where possible. At the same time, Helen says that she is not old. Sober 28 years, she still gets in the car and cranks up the tunes.

We have been talking every few days, and I am enjoying this new friendship and the education about seniors in sobriety. It helps me as I continue with the Special Needs Committee, and carry the message to the alcoholic senior who still suffers in and out of the rooms. Thanks Helen!
