Where Would I Be Had I Not Been Made Aware of AA's Presence?

The awareness of Alcoholics Anonymous is not only passed through its members, but also through various institutions such as detoxification centers, in- and outpatient rehab centers, health fairs, schools, churches and others. Who takes on the responsibility of spreading AA's message to these institutions? Members of the Public Information (PI) and Cooperation with the Professional Community (CPC) Committees. AA co-founder, Bill W., saw the need for public information as an avenue to spread the message of Alcoholics Anonymous.

We, members of PI and CPC, do service by reaching out to facilities, institutions and schools and offer to meet and speak with them to discuss AA's presence in our community and how we can be of service. We speak to counselors, directors, teachers/professors and guidance personnel, to inform them of what AA <u>does</u> and <u>does not</u> do. We offer to also speak to their clients and students. We leave them literature. We have chosen at this level to break our anonymity as members of AA to reach out to another alcoholic who may not understand what AA is: support, compassion, identification, understanding and a new way of living without the use of alcohol.

Some people having problems with alcohol use do not know what AA is other than that AA is where drunks go, or what they may have seen being portrayed in a movie. It is important to me to spread the message that AA is here to help all who decide that the use of alcohol is or may be causing a problem in their lives: men, women, young and old, those from all ethnicities, religions and sexual orientations.

I often think to myself, where would I be had I not been given that awareness. I was made aware of AA 28 years ago, but at that time I did not see myself as an alcoholic. My idea of an alcoholic was not ME. It took me another 22 years to be able to identify, relate and accept that I was indeed an alcoholic. I do believe that my exposure to AA 28 years ago paved the road to my finally turning to AA when I did accept that I was an alcoholic, and needed help with my drinking. I am sober 6 years and my life IS beyond any life I could have imagined, and because of this, I want to be one of those spreading awareness of AA in our community.

I extend an invitation to anyone who would like to join us in this endeavor. The PI and CPC Committees meet every 2nd Tuesday of the month at the Nassau Intergroup office in West Hempstead. Please join us.

July 1950—First International Convention, Cleveland; 15th anniversary; 3,000 attend. Twelve Traditions adopted.

July 1955—Second International Convention, St. Louis; 20th anniversary; 5,000 attend. Three Legacies: Unity, Recovery, and Service adopted.

July 1955—Second Edition of the Big Book published.

July 1960—Third International Convention, Long Beach; 25th anniversary; 8,900 attend. July 1960—GSO moves to 305 East 45th Street, New York City.

July 1965—Fourth International Convention, Toronto; 30th anniversary; 13,000 attend. Responsibility Declaration adopted.

July 1966—Worldwide 12,444 AA groups are registered.

July 1970—Fifth International Convention, Miami; 35th anniversary; 15,000 attend. Unity Declaration adopted. Bill W.'s last public appearance.

July 1970—GSO moves to 468 Park Avenue South, New York City.

July 1975—Sixth International Convention, Denver; 40th anniversary; 19,500 attend.

July 1975—First Regional Forum, Atlanta.

July 1975—Living Sober published.

July 1980—Seventh International Convention,

New Orleans; 45th anniversary; 25,000 attend.

July 1980—Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers published.

July 1985—Eighth International Convention, Montreal; 50th anniversary; 35,000 attend.

July 1985—Best of the Grapevine, Vol. 1 published.

July 1990—Ninth International Convention, Seattle; 55th anniversary; 48,000 attend.

July 1990—Daily Reflections published.

July 1995—Tenth International Convention, San Diego; 60th anniversary. 56,000 attend.
