#### Assisting Special Needs Folk

This anecdote of my experience with members of AA who had special needs is yellowed and faded with time, so, forgive any wandering from the facts if the similarity to someone you might know does not ring true with your recollection of events.

The more I apply my mind the more people I remember who have crossed paths with my home group, and while each had a different limitation, our group always worked hard at providing first aid and a solution to their alcohol problem.

#### "At the group level there is much we can accomplish."

We have carried wheelchair bound folk out of vans and over thresholds, we picked up a large guy who was waiting for a prosthetic leg in his color, gave him a ride and an arm to our meeting. A blind fellow complete with his service dog was led to a seat and a space for his companion. One guy in a wheelchair lived not far from the meeting and we would help him cross the road safely. As I said, more keeps coming to mind. At the group level there is much we can accomplish.

With the service dogs each case is unique. Some are ok to pet, others not, while they seem like pets they are actually working when you meet them. It's always a good idea to ask first. As a matter of fact, that holds with people too! The independence many of these folks have lost is sometimes hard to accept, so I just clear a path and wait to be asked before grabbing someone "I" think needs my help.

In closing, I am reminded of the Responsibility statement when assisting special needs folk... when anyone, anywhere reaches out for help I want the hand of AA always to be there, and for that I am responsible.

#### From the Outgoing NI Archives Chair

I would like to say it is my illness that prompts me to retire, but that would be an untruth.

I began to think that I was unique, after all how many people could do my job? I became grandiose, a character defect I have long battled. I exclaimed that a monkey could file the month to month newspapers, minutes, etc. that were part of my commitment, yet I still have 2012 in a box unfiled which means I couldn't do it. What does that say? I did complete a very large project, 35 years of Share-a-Day history, that to the exclusion of many other things like meetings (My God, how much AA do I need! I have almost 22 years sobriety), family, outings with friends, chairing detox meetings, not supporting my detox meeting co-chair, not working Steps with sponsees as I didn't have the time, etc., etc.

What happened was my life became out of balance. I was not happy and felt stressed out which made my lupus/sarcoidosis flare. I had cerebritis (an inflammation of my brain with subsequent swelling) for three months, and tons of infusions where I ceased to function at all finally culminating in a hospital stay. The one God directed action I took before I became so ill was to reconnect totally without half measures to my sponsor. We met once a week as possible, and miraculously I only missed three times during the whole 3-4 month period. I was relieved of my malady when I was with her: Two alcoholics and a "Big Book," and HP shows up! I have since been getting better and better. I show up!

I thank all of you for the honor and privilege of being a trusted servant, a servant among servants. I go to lots of meetings, enjoying them immensely. I am enjoying working Steps with current sponsees. My hand is outstretched, and I give my contact information to every woman I meet. New friends abound! Family fun, outings with friends, balance is key to sobriety. The dryness is gone. I am at every detox commitment, supporting my co-chair full measure. I have taken a commitment at my home group of Oyster/Bay Sagamore chairing a Step meeting on Sunday nights at 8 PM. So if any of you are available, please contact me. I would love to see you.

Thank you very much for this opportunity to grow in sobriety, because that is what it was for me. The history lesson for me is that half measures avail nothing, and most importantly, it works if you work it. So show that it works and pass it on. See you on the front lines.
