AA Literature

AA World Services publishes many books and pamphlets, plus guidelines and other assorted AA tools to help alcoholics in recovery. Many are familiar with "The Big Book" (B1), a guide to the AA recovery program including personal stories of struggle and finding hope and sobriety, and "*The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*" (B2) commonly called "The Step Book" where Bill W. discusses the *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions* of AA recovery. Three of which you might also be familiar are *Living Sober* (B7), examples of how AA members throughout the world live and stay sober; *Daily Reflections*(B12), a reading for each day of the week containing favorite quotations from AA literature, and *As Bill Sees It* (B5), a daily source of Bill's writings of comfort and inspiration.

Some helpful pamphlets are *Frequently Asked Questions on AA* (P2), *Questions and Answers on Sponsorship* (P15), and *The AA Member Medications and Other Drugs* (P11), a report from a group of doctors in Alcoholics Anonymous where AA members share their experience with medications and other drugs. In the coming months I hope to provide information on several more books and pamphlets. TRADITION 9—AA as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.

Safe Haven

One important thing AA offers newcomers is a sense of safety, safety not only in the cover anonymity offers as we begin to come to terms with the damage our drinking has done, begin to clean house and begin to seek emotional and spiritual growth, but also in the feeling of community and shelter our home groups can offer.

The newly sober are vulnerable in many ways. We are just beginning to learn to trust, to be more open and honest. We are unsure and unpracticed having stunted our emotional growth through our drinking years. In many ways, we are adults with all that means but facing the challenges of adolescence for the first time. We have some growing to do, and there will be some trial and error.

Recognizing the vulnerability of our newer members, more grounded and secure members may accept an obligation to assure AA is a safe haven for the newcomer. This seems as much in the spirit of "pass it on" as is sharing our experience, strength and hope on Step work. How then can I help assure that safe haven for the AA novice? Several things come to mind.

Confidences need to be kept, gossip avoided.

As individuals and as a group, we set a tone. (This is the "power of example.") To start, we respect the principle of anonymity. Confidences need to be kept, gossip avoided. We can talk collectively about what respecting anonymity means, perhaps through Tradition 11 and 12 meetings and discussions.

We can encourage the use of sponsorship, that tested program of encouragement, support and guidance so beneficial to all of us. We can also support group membership by making our groups inviting, and by encouraging newcomers to join. For new group members, a job may be a helpful tether, coffee maker, greeter or some other small responsibility perhaps.

We don't talk about it much, but there are also among us those who will prey on beginners or other vulnerable members in one way or another. We should be willing to buffer their involvement with the vulnerable, or even to intervene more assertively as individual members and as a group should we note something untoward happening. A senior group member may need to prompt the group to acknowledge a problem and to take action. Where something extreme may be occurring, groups especially need to come together to resolve an approach. (We can use our business meetings to this end.) In some instances, we may need to be willing to bar predators from our groups, or even, in rare cases, to engage the police. In a very real way, lives are at stake along with the integrity of AA.

Am I helping to watch out for the welfare of newer and other vulnerable members, to assure my home group is a safe haven?
