#### **A Reflection of Alkathons Past**

'Twas just two holiday seasons ago, it was a hectic night at the Nassau Intergroup Reps meeting due to the organizing and group sign up for the Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Alkathons. I had gotten my time slot for Thanksgiving and was now awaiting the available time slots for New Year's. When it got to me there was only one time slot open, 2 AM–5 AM. Someone said just take it, it's probably meant to be. So I did.

When I presented my group with the New Year's Alkathon time slot I did so with lots of enthusiasm. Suggesting that many of the young newcomers may need a place to go and it would be a worthwhile experience. After a couple of weeks my signup sheets were still empty. Now the resentments started, and I found myself thinking and focusing on other AA members how they need to do more service, etc.

New Year's Eve came and the people that were needed showed up, one group member flew into Kennedy that night at 1 AM, stopped by on his way home and spoke at the 2 AM meeting. Another had a very restless sponsee, and she took the 3 AM meeting. As always there were many there to lend a hand.

Meanwhile, my partner at home relapsed on December  $30^{th}$ , 2012. Knowing I would be gone for many hours I informed his brother who lived next door of my plans. On the  $31^{st}$  I went off to two sober parties before my 2 AM commitment at Intergroup, and didn't arrive home until almost 7 AM. He was in really bad condition when I got home, never even knew I was gone. On January  $3^{rd}$ , 2013 I arrived home from work at 3:15 PM to find him lying on the floor, dead from an overdose.

I soon realized that the resentments and feelings I had towards others about doing or not doing service at the Alkathon were and still are none of my business. I believe my Higher Power led me there because I needed those 5+ hours of meetings, fellowship, recovery and service to cope with what was to come. I now have such gratitude when reflecting back, not on the situation but on what I learned. This year I am honored to chair the New Year's Alkathon.

## 24/7 Double "A" Assistance

Some call Triple A for emergency road service. For some contacting Double A is advisable. Similar to auto clubs, Nassau's Hotline/Nightbook offers 24/7 assistance.

The importance of this service for this member is personal. As dysfunctional as an automobile without fuel – nothing operational – on the morning of 11/11 road side service arrived, two AA members to accompany this member to his first Alcoholics Anonymous meeting. That "Twelve Step" call changed this member's life!

Volunteering for the Nightbook service strengthens a home group and its members – not only those who choose to stand with prospects but with fellow members. The routine stories of early evening calls (usually checking on times or place of a meeting) mid-evening to early morning calls (just to share with another member, to "take the edge off.")

But every so often the "distraught one" – down to the last hope is on the line – and you connect enough that he/she asks to go to a meeting. At that point, the Nightbook representative refers the prospect to a contact to set up the Twelve Step call that changes each involved individuals life.

As a pebble it is my hope to fill a calendar year with names and so that whoever dials the "hotline" will always reach another alcoholic to talk to. I personally am making myself available on March 27<sup>th</sup>, but I am hoping anyone else who has the same sober date will see the possibilities and join me. That way if I have an engagement I cannot get out of, the phone will still be answered.

Did you know that in SENY there are 13 intergroups. We are one of only two counties; the other is Suffolk, which has live alcoholics answering phones after business hours! Not to say people don't get sober anywhere else, but if you have done the Nightbook I don't need to explain the feeling when I hear someone say, "I'm new, I need help." There is nothing like it.

The Nightbook is the core function of Nassau Intergroup. It started as a phone service at its conception. Everything else it does is second to this! In the Big Book you will find this sentence in the Forward to the Third Edition, "Recovery begins when one alcoholic talks to another . . . ." Keeping in mind that our whole program rests on the fact that Bill W. did not go see Dr. Bob to save Bob, he went there to save Bill!

Join me; make Nassau Intergroup's Hotline the best it can be! It is the heart of what we do. Let's not skip a beat!
