



Help Wanted

By now I am sure everybody has heard that the new meeting books have come in. One of the reasons for there being such a delay in this printing is the success of our web site.

We have on line both a plain vanilla copy of the meeting list in the traditional printed version format of a listing by town of the groups and their meetings. In addition there is also a "searchable" version. Using this – a person can locate meetings in a particular town, or 5, 10 or 20 miles around that town. You can locate meetings by day of the week, hour of the day or even the type of meeting you want to attend.

This searchable section of the website does require some specialized programming. In addition to the "html" and "css" that web sites are created in, this part of the site also requires coding in "php" and "mysql". All of these are constantly evolving and being updated and made more secure. The web committee is in need of someone versed in php and mysql to help maintain this searchable meeting list.

In the brief time that it has been online – there are already fixes in the program that are causing problems with the functioning of the adding/editing meetings that are listed.

So, please if you have any skills in php, mysql or PERL, consider joining the web committee on the 3rd Wednesday of every month, 7:30 PM the Intergroup office.

The next printing of the meeting books, will likely be in the late fall. As a reminder – any changes must be submitted on one of the "*Meeting List Changes*" form. These are available at the office and on the web site.

Changes to existing meetings/groups do get posted to the web within a couple of weeks, and added to the next printed edition. New groups get posted to web site right away, but do not get added to the printed lists until they have been meeting for at least 6 months (counted from when the form is received in the office).

Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surly destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.

Join us on July 12 at the Nassau Intergroup Treasurer's workshop as we discuss what our Seventh Tradition suggests about where money and spirituality meet in practice in every day AA.

Armed Service Members in Recovery

When I want an AA meeting, I can walk a few blocks or hop in my car and drive a few miles to a local meeting place, there to enjoy the support and experience of the fellowship. For AA's among the men and women in our armed forces serving around the country and around the world, that often is not an option. Whether stationed at a base in a remote part of Alaska, serving in the provinces of Afghanistan, or onboard a Navy ship at sea off the Korean peninsula or in the Persian Gulf, AA members in the armed services need and want the hand of AA to be available to them too. One way to support our fellow members whose service to our country has imposed a degree of isolation from the fellowship is through *AA for Troops*.

As an independent AA service group, AA for Troops provides recorded AA meetings via the internet to interested AA members with the special goal of decreasing the isolation of members in the armed services. From their website, "The stateside recordings we provide are intended to say 'Thank You for Your Service' and to help isolated AA members maintain their sanity and sobriety."

How does AA for Troops work? AA for Troops is looking for AA meetings and members willing to be recorded so they can be added to AA for Troops' online meeting library. All recordings are fully anonymity protected. That library is then available to anyone who cannot make a face to face meeting for any reason. AA for Troops will provide everything needed to help make those recordings including the recording equipment, and technical and logistical support.

Everything About Me

I started drinking at the age of 12. I found myself drinking because it was social and exciting; Rock & Roll, disco, pubs, park benches, beach parties and after hour clubs. I always had a need to be part of. Before my 20th birthday my parents thought it was a good idea to offer me a partnership in the family business. I was overwhelmed by the thought of helping my dad. My dad who came home to teach me how to ride a bicycle at the age of 7 years old. Who within minutes he threw me down and yelled, "What are you stupid! Why can't you ride?" I was a stuffer, in denial that I was resentful at him, which caused me to have an attitude of selfishness and self-centeredness. I tore the papers up. The anger, quilt, shame and frustration made decisions for me.

I almost lost my life in April of 1987, waiting to go to a detox. I desired to come back to the fellowship. I was physically beaten, lonely and hurt. I finally did not want what I had anymore. I asked God to remove this terrible curse, the obsession. I finally thanked God for saving me from death. I got a sponsor and he taught me sponsee-sponsor, and home group. He told me all I needed was the faith of a mustard seed. He said to thank God in the morning that he is helping me stay sober and thank Him at night. He said if I learn to thank God in the morning.

I probably won't drink. He said to "Keep It Simple." Freely receive and freely give: AAIOU. Within weeks of doing a searching and fearless inventory, I was able to become resentment free. I was able to repair the relationship with my parents. I was able to right a relationship that I thought was wrong. I was able to stop lying and repeating lies. I was able to stop making everything about me. I was able to give to God what I wasn't able to do on my own aided willpower. I learned how to receive love and be able to give love back to them.

By the grace of a loving God, and the AA fellowship, I am sober.
