

Be an Angel on a Shoulder

Taking the Nightbook commitment is an excellent, and selfless way of doing Service. When you answer that AA Hotline phone between 5:00 PM on your chosen day until 9:00 AM the next morning, to the person who calls up, YOU are AA. Most people call up for meetings, some looking for AA events such as group Anniversaries and the like, and some just need another Alcoholic to talk to . . . no matter how late it is. What's nice about taking the Nightbook is that almost everyone thanks you for your Service and lets you know that you are special. I like doing it because I'm helping my sobriety possibly even more than I'm helping the caller. I tell volunteers that taking one night of the Hotline is like adding 10 years to your sobriety!

Most of the calls are routine, but some are really memorable and leave an indelible print on your emotions. One such call happened to me just a few weeks ago. I took "The Book" on a Saturday night; usually a busy night for going to meetings and group anniversaries. It was about 7:30 PM, and a woman called up. It was raining heavily and she was driving around looking for a specific meeting that she had never been to before. The visibility wasn't the greatest and she sounded nervous. I had the meeting list out in front of me and I found what she was looking for; however, she wasn't even sure of where she was, she just had a general idea, and to make matters worse, she had NO GPS device with her. I told her to calm down, pull over and stop at the next intersection and tell me the streets.

She could only make out "Route 107" on the sign. I had my laptop out and I punched up Google Maps. I asked her what landmarks or stores were near her, and if she could remember the last big intersection she had passed. She told me that a few blocks ago she passed Hempstead Turnpike and a Mavis Tire Shop on the corner. I found her location and quickly plotted directions to her meeting, which was only about 12 minutes away from her. Very nervous, she asked me if I could stay on the phone with her until she got to her meeting. I said "Sure, no problem."

Within minutes, she arrived at her destination. She couldn't thank me enough, and said that I was her "guardian angel tonight!" I, of course, felt a great sense of satisfaction that gave a huge feeling of purpose to my whole day. The "high" that I got from that one call was better than any feeling I ever got from out of a bottle of booze. You too, can be an "Angel for a night." Just volunteer and have your home group take the Nightbook!

Where Money & Spirituality Mix: A Discussion

On Saturday, July 12, 2014, Nassau Intergroup will offer a special workshop dedicated to a review of many of the topics, questions and issues which typically come up concerning money in AA. And while the discussion will focus on the needs of our home groups, members involved with other service committees and groups may also be interested in joining us.

The conversation will cover many themes including a look at Tradition 7, prioritizing group spending and deciding on a prudent reserve, setting up a bank account, sales tax exemption, insurance, contributions to the service structure beyond the home group, paying for group anniversaries, and more. Handouts will include the wealth of experience currently available from AA World Services and some other materials especially developed locally to answer some of the questions which commonly come up, but which may not be covered elsewhere.

This exchange is especially suggested for members who are stepping up to serve as their group's treasurer, members who are considering stepping up to that kind of service, or for members who are just interested in or concerned with matters of finance in AA. We hope too that members with good experience in these areas will join us to share what they have learned and enrich our discussion.

Nassau's treasurer (Elise M., treasurer@nassauny-aa.org) and the Financial Review Committee will co-host this get together running from 11am to 2pm including a light lunch. All are welcome.
