AA HISTORY FOR OCTOBER

October 20, 1928— Bill W. makes a pledge in the family Bible, "that I have finished with drink forever."

October 1938 - Bill W.'s recall of the first use of the name "Alcoholics Anonymous."

October 14, 1939 — Journal of the American Medical Association gives the "Big Book" a negative review.

October 30, 1951— AA receives the Lasker Award from the American Public Health Association.

October 1954— Alcoholic Foundation, Inc. renamed the General Service Board of AA, Inc.

October 1958— AA Comes of Age is published.

October 9-11, 1969— First World Service Meeting held in NYC.

October 5, 1988 - Lois W. dies, age 97, at Mt. Kisco, NY.

FAQs About AA History from AAWS *

Q.— I've heard it said that Bill always wished he could change the beginning of 'How It Works' to read "Never have we seen a person fail who has thoroughly followed our path" (rather than "Rarely have we seen "). Is this true?

A.— No. A rumor has persisted for years that Bill wished he could have changed "rarely" to "never." But we know, through Bill's own words, that that is not the case. In a letter to Les V., dated May 25, 1961 Bill W. stated:

> "Concerning your comment about the use of the word 'rarely' in Chapter Five of the Big Book. My recollection is that we did give a considerable thought at the time of writing. I think the main

reason for the use of 'rarely' was to avoid anything that would look like a claim for a 100 % result. Assuming of course that an alcoholic is willing enough and sane enough, there can be a perfect score on such character. But since willingness and sanity are such illusive and fluctuating values, we simply didn't like to be too positive. The medical profession could jump right down our throats . . . I do remember thinking about it a lot."

Who Am I?

I started out helping young AA with fund raising for the book, Alcoholics Anonymous. I also helped nascent AA come to the practice of declining outside contributions and the policy of having on hand only reasonable funds for immediate needs plus a prudent reserve, the core ideas in AA's Tradition Seven and Concept XII, Warranties One and Two. I was there when AA was coming of age and the fledgling General Service Conference was helping AA define its future path. I'm still around today as a key participant in AA's service structure.





Answer to Who Am I?

Alcoholic Foundation. Inc. Supported by early non-alcoholic friends of AA Willard Richardson, Frank Amos and LeRoy Chapman (all associates of John D. Rockefeller, Jr.), and with the help of attorney John Wood, a plan was developed in 1938 for a tax-free charitable foundation to provide young AA with some formal structure. This trust was named the Alcoholic Foundation, and first met on August 11, 1938. The original trustees were non-alcoholics Richardson, Amos and Wood, and AA members Bill R. (a member from New York) and Dr. Bob. The terms of the trust included the provision that an alcoholic trustee would resign if he/she became drunk. Bill W. served on an eight member advisory committee. The Foundation gave AA a formal center which served early on as a fundraising unit for the "Big Book" project. In October 1954, the Foundation was renamed the General Service Board of AA. Inc. Today. AA's Board serves to give form to the directives of the AA General Service Conference and to manage the real time business of AA in its world affairs.
