Once sober, everyone, yes EVERY ONE including you, has the capacity to carry the message to the next sick and suffering alcoholic. Many people think, that is for other people who really get it or have some kind of special talent or people skills or (fill in the blank). Yet, just by your sharing your unique experience with finding a solution to the misery of alcoholism, you are qualified to carry the message.

Whether it be one-on-one, sharing in a meeting, setting up chairs and coffee or doing work at the group or district level, by virtue of having had a spiritual awakening or a *'profound alteration in his reaction to life', you may perform this important work. TO ALL MEMBERS Greetings On Our 10th Christmas 1944

Yes, it's in the air! The spirit of Christmas once more warms this poor distraught world. Over the whole globe millions are looking forward to that one day when strife can be forgotten, when it will be remembered that all human beings, even the least are loved by God, when men will hope for the coming of the Prince of Peace as they never hoped before.

But there is another world which is not poor. Neither is it distraught.

It is the world of Alcoholics Anonymous, where thousands dwell happily and secure. Secure because each of us, in his own way, knows a greater power who is love, who is just, and who can be trusted.

Nor can men and women of AA ever forget that only through suffering did they find enough humility to enter the portals of that New World.

How privileged we are to understand so well the divine paradox that strength rises from weakness, that humiliation goes before resurrection; that pain is not only the price but the very touchstone of spiritual rebirth.

Knowing it's full worth and purpose, we can no longer fear adversity, we have found prosperity where there was poverty, peace and joy have sprung out of the very midst of chaos.

Great indeed, our blessings!

And so,-- Merry Christmas to you all -- from the Trustees, from Bobbie and from Lois and me.

Concept XII: General Warranties of the Conference: in all its proceedings, the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, taking great care that the conference never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle; that none of the Conference Members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decisions be reached by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

This concept is a direct repeat of Article 12 of the General Service Conference Charter. The Charter is the agreed basis upon which the Conference operates. Unlike the first 11 articles which can be amended by the Conference itself at any time, Article 12 is in a class by itself in that it can only be amended or cancelled by written consent of three-quarters of all directory listed groups who would actually vote on any such proposals and the considerable time of six months must be given for careful deliberation. At the very beginning we see a link established between the Conference and the Traditions which then flows into the Warranties which the Conference is charged to protect:

Warranty One: protection against the accumulation of too much wealth and too much authority in Conference hands.

Warranty Two: sufficient operating funds and ample reserve; it must be communicated effectively to the groups why it is important to support A.A. as a whole from our own contributions and not take outside donations.

Warranty Three: Conference members are not in charge, they serve. This goes directly to our rights of "Participation, Appeal and Petition".

Warranty Four: Decisions made by discussion, vote and when possible "substantial unanimity". No simple majority for us on important matters. What constitutes "unanimity" is left open and up to the various entities, be it the Conference itself, Area Assemblies, etc. to decide if it is two-thirds, three-quarters or some other majority.

Warranty Five: No personally punitive actions or incitement to public controversy should ever be used. The harmony, security and future effectiveness of A.A. is at stake here.

Warranty Six: No acts of government shall take place, in order to always remain democratic in action and in spirit. Mutual trust, respect and love should always prevail and no action ought ever be taken in anger, haste or recklessness; that minorities be protected and that we always be prudently on guard against tyrannies, great or small, whether in the majority or the minority.

This is certainly an oversimplification of this Concept and I suggest all read Bill W's full essay in *The A.A. Service Manual Combined with Twelve Concepts for World Service*.

NIAA Institutions Committee

I'm Archie, as of October 2018, I'm the new H&I Chair for Nassau Intergroup AA.

Our primary purpose is to bring meetings into hospitals, institutions, jails, rehabs, detox, psych wards and the VA. We also work closely with the Chair of the Corrections Committee. They provide meetings and literature to jails and correctional facilities.

The goal of the Committee is simple, as stated in Step 12 and Tradition 5. Please note Step 12 states "Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of the steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics and to practice these principles in all our affairs". Also, Tradition 5 says "Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers".

We, just like AA as a whole, are made up of volunteers with a particular desire to reach out to those in hospitals, jails, institutions and other facilities. Anyone with an interest or desire is welcome to participate.

We meet on the first Wednesday of the month at the Intergroup office at 8:00 PM. The main purpose of the meeting is to bring together the chairperson of each facility with the reps and people who can fill the available dates to speak.

The secondary purpose is to distribute conference approved AA literature, newsletters and meeting lists. This is where the bulk of the donations for H&I are allocated for each year. Thus providing free literature to the patients and/or inmates.

Finally, the meeting is used as a forum to discuss any issue of importance to the committee.

The two ways you and groups can support the work of carrying the AA message is to:

Send a rep to the H&I monthly meetings (first Wednesday each month at 361 Hempstead Turnpike, West Hempstead) to book speaking commitments.

The H&I committee recommends that 5% of a group's donations be earmarked for H&I as per General Services guidelines. However, it is up to each group to determine the appropriate amount.

Donations of literature can also be made.

The founders of AA were visionaries in their characterization of alcoholism as a disease. And we, the alcoholics who suffer from this disease, are gravely ill. And with help we can get well.

The NIAA Institutions Committee is the longest running committee. It brings AA's experience, strength and hope to those whom are in hospitals, institutions and jails.

Nowadays most of us find our way to AA through those paths of sort. While those institutions provide treatment for acute symptoms of the disease, we can provide the information and introduction to the broader AA community as a necessity to get well and stay sober.

To all the groups and individuals who participate, respond to requests for donations, the speakers, the chairs who hold the meetings, arrange and book speakers as well as carry the AA message, your experience, strength and hope are noticed. So I offer my sincerest appreciation.

Tradition 12: Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.



A picture is worth a thousand words.

Tradition Twelve reminds us that anonymity is the foundation of all of the traditions. Some years ago my sponsor took me on a little walking tour through the other eleven Traditions, with that idea in mind, to see what we would see. Before we began our little trek he drew my attention to an idea expressed in the long form of

Tradition Six: that as individuals and as a whole we can be "easily distracted" from our life-saving mission by temptations of ego and pride. Each of the traditions helps us navigate these potential pitfalls through the principle of anonymity.

Tradition One and Two put up a guardrail against individual pride and ambition. The first one tells us that each member of AA (regardless of any distinguishing characteristics) is but "a small part of a great whole." Anonymity thus establishes basic equality. Who I am, as far as my name, profession, social status, popularity, etc. means nothing in AA. It is "we," not the "I," that matters to us. Tradition Two gives us a way to safeguard the equality of Tradition One by keeping power/authority separate from individuals and/or personalities. All of our personal ambitions are overshadowed by the anonymous process we call "group conscience" through which a loving God can work.

Tradition Three points out that there is only one personal characteristic that matters to us: that you are alcoholic. This common problem helps us all arrive as equals on our very first day. Tradition Four continues along these lines by suggesting that just as our *individual* lives are equal within our respective groups, the group themselves are also equal in relation to other groups. No part of AA has power over any other part. This level authority is maintained in part by Tradition Five, which suggests that each group have a single shared purpose: hoping alcoholics get sober. While each of us may feel that our home group is "special," in the eyes of the Fellowship it is not.

Having shed any special status, groups are encouraged to maintain that anonymous position of equality by resisting the temptation to distinguish themselves as special or different through affiliation or financial support from outside entities.

Traditions Eight and Nine remind us that even though we may have "special workers" we do not have "special members." And even the boards and committees we may form to assist with our work should be kept free of dominant personalities or individual ambition through the principle of rotating leadership. This keeps our focus on the work, rather than on the workers.

Traditions Ten and Eleven draw our attention to the value of anonymity in our interaction with the outside world. We are reminded to avoid adopting an identity beyond our primary purpose through the dangerous assumption of controversial opinions or positions. As an organization we don't promote ourselves as the "best" or "only" way to get sober. We are one way among many that may exist. Our public position is that our approach has worked for us and if you want it, you can have it.

The last thing my sponsor pointed out is that even though we place "principles before personalities," we do not entirely lose those personalities. It's not that our individual identities are completely unimportant. We just find it best to rank them as less important, when it comes to the work of AA, than the principles that continue to keep us all safe, sober, and useful to others.
