Literature sales returned to Intergroup last month and are now available both before and after the monthly Reps meetings, and again daily, 9am-5pm. We pride ourselves on having on hand almost everything AA World Services and AA Grapevine offer and in good quantities, and a "Literature and Other Items Catalogue" is available in the office for review. (Out of stock for a while, Intergroup's popular "Newcomer Packet" is again available.) As in the past, phone ahead to assure the office is open before coming in as we don't always have volunteers on hand, particularly if the weather is unsettled.

Remember that office volunteers will not be able to make change, and that sales are in cash, check or money order only. (No credit or debit cards at this time although we will be discussing the possibility of adding that service in future.) For Special Orders, those which exceed the items and quantities usually available for sale in the front office (such as physically large items like the "Steps" shades or "Preamble" placards, or unusually large quantities of any item), you need to contact the Literature Chair to arrange the purchase. (Contact Literature if you're not sure if you need to arrange a Special Order.) Fulfillment for Special Orders can usually be within a very few days unless items need to be ordered in. Some orders may need to be pre-paid.

We are still on our learning curve with the Point of Sale literature sales system, so please bear with us while we continue to become more familiar, comfortable and effective with it.

In other matters, watch this column for word on the agenda touching literature as we move toward the 70<sup>th</sup> General Service Conference in April so your group can have its say. That agenda should be available very soon. Bill C., Literature Committee Chair

Upon walking into my first AA meeting April 25, 2014 with that feeling in the pit of my stomach (we are all too familiar with), of course my eyes rested on the strategically placed shades. Not an easy thing to miss. Step 1, ok you got me, I'm here. Then the all-powerful Step 2, the Cornerstone, the Hope, the Solution to the problem that was Step 1.

Of course, no one is clear enough to see that yet. What do we see? 2 other problems. Came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity. Problem 1 There is no Power greater than myself Problem 2, I'm not crazy.

Problem 1 There is no Power greater than myself Problem 2, I'm not crazy. What we don't realize is that the insanity referred to in step 2 is the old "threadbare" Idea that every alcoholic has that someday, someway, somehow, we will be able to drink like normal people. That somehow, we will be able to control our drinking. This time it *WILL* be different. And therefore, we get drunk on a lie and we get sober on the truth. Along comes Step 2 with its simple beautiful wisdom, it offers hope, it's solution. Like many other alcoholics my experience with this step was: that of course I was my own higher power and I didn't do a very good job. Managing my own life was not my strongest point and because I couldn't manage my own life, I decided I was going to manage everyone else's as well. And normally as alcoholics if we can't use ourselves as higher power, we normally choose other things that we deem just as worthy like money, prestige, jobs, toxic relationships, codependency 's or *King Alcohol*. Everything except the obvious. God was Not an option for me at first because I was still trying to resolve the way I was living my life, And my idea of the way I should be living my life with a God idea, the two of them did not mix.

Until I could resolve those two forces within myself, I needed to use the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous as my higher power: anything was better than me. I also found it ironic that the chapter in a big book step 2 was introduced is in we agnostics and we agnostics speaks more about faith than any other chapter in the book.

Because, all we really need it was a willingness. But what really cinched it for me was page 52 with its bedevilments and dark promises. I had all of these, wonderful way to live. "we think not" because I had been the manager of my own life for so long.

But again, that measure of hope, that mustard seed was right there and all I needed was the willingness to believe in a power greater than myself.

So, what did I find in my step 2 experience? I found the God of my childhood again only different, only better, through the program and the fellowship.

## Tradition II



This is like Step 2 in the idea of finding that Power Greater than Ourselves. The only difference being in the steps we do it on an individual level and in the traditions we do it on a group level.

And who better to express the group conscience then a loving God as the group understands him. Not as the individual understands him.

Our primary purpose is to pass that message to the alcoholic who still suffers. If we couldn't manage our own lives and we had to find that power greater than ourselves that could restore us to sanity what would make us think that we didn't need to do that on the collective level? What would make us think that a bunch of undisciplined alcoholics without guidance from a loving God would be able to properly "manage" a group composed of alcoholics.

So, what does having a loving God expressing himself in our group conscience do for us? God speaks to us through the group.

First off, we are guided that we should be a group of AAs not just a meeting. We need to be connected to AA, which means we *should be* registered with the General Service Office, we *should* have a <u>GSR</u> and an <u>Intergroup rep</u>. This way our members know exactly what's happening at World services and at AA as a fellowship. We need to make sure that it's the voice of God that we hear at our business meetings and not the voice of the pride and ego of our members.

## We don't need a king and queen of AA.

This is especially true when it comes to voting At AA business meetings. We must make sure that we're voting in a fair and honest way that we are not listening or being swayed by votes of friends.

Tradition II continued. This is especially true when it comes to voting At AA business meetings. We must make sure that we're voting in a fair and honest way that we are not listening or being swaved by votes of friends. This can be especially true of the newcomer who may be in awe of someone. And, especially Members who belong to more than one group and do service in more than one group should keep in mind they really can only vote at their home group. This is where the voice of God comes in. Because we all know that there are no police waiting to arrest you or kick you out of AA, but we do know that this is between you and god as you understand him. We of AA have been blessed with these traditions. We should always do our best to try to stay close to them, the closer we are to the principles of the steps and the traditions the further away from the bottle we are.

I was ordered to go to AA in 1993after a drunken driving charge. Apparently, the state thought I had a drinking problem. Some nerve they had, assuming someone has a problem just because they got caught once drinking and driving. Every construction guy I knew had a built-in bar in his utility truck box, right? I didn't see what the problem was.

I strolled into my first meeting 10 minutes late, and when the chairperson wouldn't sign my court paper unless I stayed for the rest of the meeting, I became infuriated. The nerve! Who do these people think they are anyway? So there I sat, obstinate and angry at the world, as recovery words floated by closed ears to pass time, I looked up at the walls and saw these corny little frames that said stupied, trite things like "One Day at a Time", "let Go and Let God" and "Live and Let Live "I remember thinking, How did I end up here? But I had no answer to that question, because I was still a budding sick alcoholic.

When I finally arrived for good in 2006, those same slogans were still on the wall. And they are still too corny for me, but this time alcohol the bully had twisted my arm behind my back, and I had said "Uncle".

I was thoroughly beaten. I was convinced now to let some of those corny words enter my head, if for no other reason than to push out the junk blocking my rational thinking, which at this point was diminishing rapidly.

Today, those slogans have great meaning to me; they're the cornerstone of my program. I live them, I teach them to the men I sponsor. I have many favorite sayings that I have heard over the years, most of which you won't see on the meeting walls. I love that the AA program is one of plagiarism.

When you hear something wise, later you share it at another meeting. My personal favorite is "Faith can move Mountains but bring a shovel." Its message is, "Faith without Works is Dead" In other words, we need to do the work; God helps those who help themselves.

To me, our slogans teach the new guy every bit as much as our literature does. They were made up by our old timers and have been passed down since the program began. They're an interpretation of our big book-in simple terms-in our own AA language. They've helped me go beyond the "black and white" of the worse themselves, as these frames on the walls literally become pictures in my mind. So, go ahead and plagiarize. Let's share the news to lose the booze!
