Having served as District Committee Member Chair (DCMC) for Nassau General Service when COVID-19 compelled most AA meetings to close temporarily and many AA events to be canceled, I now have the privilege of serving Nassau Intergroup at a time when our beloved newsletter comes back into publication after its pandemic pause. *Hurrah!*

Since I got sober in 1995, I have had the privilege of serving AA in various ways, at the local and Area level, in positions ranging from SENY Accessibility Chair to greeter for my home group. AA service has helped me replace loneliness, self-pity, and depression with a growing sense of personal value through helping others. I encourage each of you to find out whether AA service can similarly benefit you. Feel free to contact any of the Intergroup Officers or Committee Chairs to discuss available service opportunities.

Also, January is a great month to consider Step 1 and Tradition 1. Step 1 requires me to admit powerlessness over alcohol. Still, it also

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Sobriety in the Time of Covid

During the pandemic, the Sober Network Cast was crucial in helping people stay connected and sober.

We planted the first digital seeds of our new virtual group in 2013 through a text chat, which maxed out quickly at a time when not every phone had text capabilities. We switched to a WhatsApp chat group in 2016, officially calling ourselves Sober Network Cast and sharing sobriety-related messages throughout the day.

Our digital presence grew when we debuted our Sobriety Talk Show, live cast on Zoom, and later posted on YouTube. We added weekend video check-ins in New York, Raleigh, and Boston.

So when COVID squelched live meetings in March 2020, Yours Truly felt called to meet with other AAs on Zoom at a Saturday morning meeting. The word got around pretty fast, and we hit the max limit before everyone got to log in or share. Messages flooded my phone, including, "When are we having the next one?" from Brian M. I deferred the question to my Higher Power, and the response came immediately: Tonight! So we did, reading from the Big Book and holding our first business meeting right after. Peter C. asked our first question: "How do we carry this message to other alcoholics?"

Alcoholics got to work. We decided to run a 6 pm daily online meeting, figuring that if we drank daily, we needed recovery daily, too. We established a meeting schedule, which we still follow today: Monday

Sobriety in the Time of Covid, cont'd.

Meditation, Tuesday Beginners, Wednesday Step, Thursday Reflections Round Robin, Friday Closed Discussion, Saturday Big Book, and Sunday Living Sober + Surprise Format. Calls from fellow members looking to do service lit up my phone.

By the end of the week, we had 25 service commitments, including Visual Slides, Spiritual Bouncer (to handle disruptive trolls), Host to moderate, and Speaker for the commitment: two group reps, Neil R. and Liz J., secured speakers on an exchange. We established an email and registered the group; Venmo and PayPal accounts satisfied our 7th Tradition. Something more than "Life on Life's Terms" was going on. Simply accepting our new reality was not enough. We had to have the courage to change. We asked our Higher Power for guidance, and our HP gave it as we grew.

My wife was interested, so we also set up a meeting for Al-Anon's. We felt flush with spirituality as if we were making amends to our loved ones by being of service. There are no back rows on Zoom and no excuse to miss a meeting. If a drink is only an arm's length away, meetings are even closer—at our fingertips.

We celebrated anniversaries in the open-air parking lot and mailed sobriety coins for milestones. When we sadly lost a few members of the group to this disease, we grieved together, too, attending virtual funerals and memorial services. Rain, snow, or shine, even power outages, we were there. Socially distant but digitally and spiritually connected through constant conscious contact. The SN experience starts early each morning with dings on our phones. As Scott W reminds us, "It's a good day to be sober." Indeed, it is.

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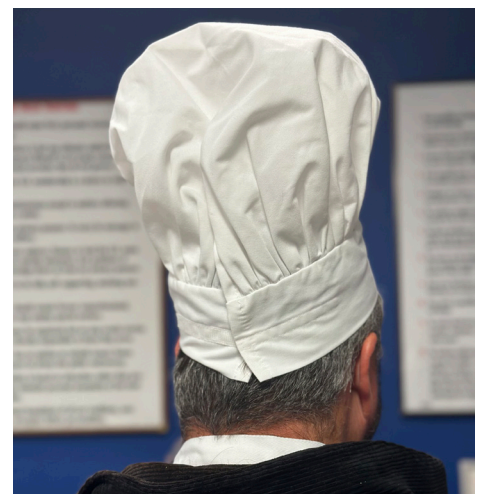
Great Plates

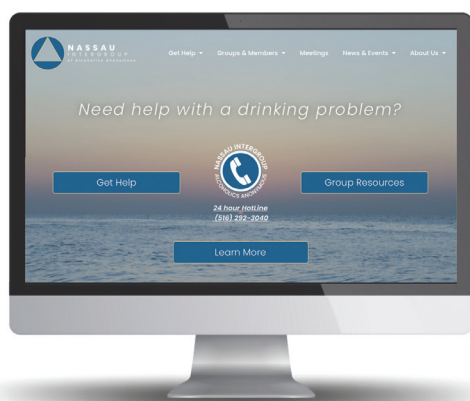

Technology has become a vital utility, helping us carry the AA message of recovery among ourselves and to alcoholics who still suffer.

At Nassau Intergroup (aka IAN), the Technology Committee ensures we have the tech tools we need for that purpose and that they work well.

Tech's umbrella covers a broad, loosely aligned, and interrelated range of tech-engaged service activities. It includes our website integrating the online meeting list, support for the office literature Point of Sale (POS) system, management of our member/group contact lists, support for our virtual/hybrid meetings online, updating software on our various hardware devices, and support for all other aspects of in-house tech.

MORE FROM THE CHAIR

Like many other AA service entities, Nassau Intergroup changes with the times. We do not take a position on outside matters, but we are affected by global and local influences. For example, our literature sales have been adversely affected by the pandemic and increased reliance by many AA members on electronic versions of books and pamphlets. Similarly, the Reserve Fund for AA General Services (managed by the AA General Service Board) reflects changing literature purchasing patterns. Despite an increase in 7th Tradition contributions to the AA General Service Board since the onset of the pandemic, decreased literature sales at the international level have led to a depletion of the Reserve Fund for AA General Services.

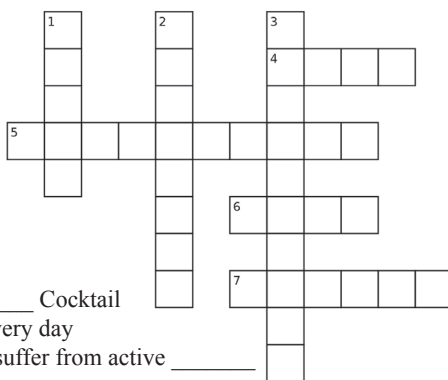

The International Convention is Coming!

Vancouver will welcome A.A. members from around the world for the 2025 International Convention.

Taking place once every five years, the A.A. International Convention marks the anniversary of Bill W.'s first meeting with Dr. Bob and the birth of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1935. A.A. members and their families and friends from around the globe attend the event. People attend meetings, workshops, dances, and events at the International Convention. The International Convention will take place from July 3 - 6, 2025, at the Vancouver Convention Centre and BC Place Stadium. A highlight is the traditional flag ceremony to celebrate sobriety worldwide. The theme of the 2025 International Convention is "90 Years – Language of the Heart."



The History of A.A. International Conventions

International Conventions, steadily growing in size, have been held since 1950. That year, 3,000 A.A. members, including Bill W. and Dr. Bob., gathered in Cleveland, Ohio.

Attendance at Conventions has grown steadily since. Most recently 2015, in Atlanta, Georgia, an estimated 57,000 A.A. members attended. The convention had 5,000 volunteers - some local, others from distant states and countries.

At A.A.'s International Conventions, attendees virtually took over the city, filling hotels and crowding the coffee shops. A.A. members enjoyed many activities - live music, dances, hospitality rooms, and more than 250 meetings held in more than 10 languages, including ASL (American Sign Language).
